Japan," he explains, emphasizing the university's role in ensuring that these students can contribute meaningfully to the Japanese workforce and society at large.



tionship with China is inseparable," notes Hirose, underscoring the university's ongoing commitment to fostering academic and cultural ties with China, despite current geopolitical tensions.

Looking forward, Aichi University aims to expand its global reach by exploring new partnerships in Western countries and in Southeast Asia. Hirose states: "We are thinking about possible partnerships in Italy or France," indicating the university's strategic vision for the future. "This expansion is part of a broader goal to diversify the university's international student body and strengthen its global presence."

As Aichi University approaches its 80th anniversary in 2026, Hirose envisions a future where the institution continues to thrive as a global university, contributing both to Japan's academic landscape and its society, and to the world. "When I complete my term as president, my aim is to leave the university in a stronger position with a promising future," he says. This includes not only advancing human resources but also broadening the university's focus to encompass more science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) related fields.

Since its founding in 1900 by Umeko Tsuda, Tsuda University has pioneered women's higher education in Japan. The university is dedicated to fostering female leaders who make significant impacts domestically and internationally. Yuko Takahashi, the 11th university president, emphasizes: "The key is to increase female participation in top management roles." At Tsuda University, women hold many leadership positions, making it exceptional in Japan's largely male-dominated academic landscape.

Tsuda University emphasizes intercultural exchanges, partnering with 32 universities in 14 countries, enhancing students' crosscultural communication skills and broadening their horizons. The university aims to attract more international students, particularly from



Southeast Asia, by introducing more English programs and support through a dedicated Center for International Exchange. This focus on global perspectives prepares students for an increasingly interconnected world.

Despite Japan's low ranking in the World Economic Forum's gender gap index, Tsuda University strives to challenge and change this status quo. The government plans to fill 30 percent of leadership positions in various fields with women by 2030, but it still has a long way to go. Tsuda University supports this goal through initiatives that empower women to take on leadership roles and change traditional perceptions. President Takahashi highlights that the visibility of women in leadership roles at the university serves as a powerful example



for both female and male students, showing that gender equity is achievable and beneficial.

Looking ahead, President Takahashi envisions Tsuda University continuing to be a catalyst for change. The Tsuda Vision 2030 aims to preserve the founding spirit of Umeko Tsuda while adapting to modern demands. One of the primary goals is to increase the international student headcount to over 100, fostering a diverse and inclusive academic environment. Additionally, the university plans to enhance its English language programs to reduce barriers for international students and to better prepare all students for global careers.
